Churches In One Accord (CIOA) is a relational fellowship founded in 1999 by Drs. B. Theron and Grace M. Williams. It brings churches, ministry leaders, and community partners into meaningful Kingdom relationship for prayer, counsel, equipping, collaboration, and faithful representation of the Kingdom of God.

RELATIONAL FOUNDATION CIOA understands covenant relationship as a meaningful exchange of commitments, privileges, and responsibilities—not merely placement on a directory.

What participating churches may receive

- Pastoral prayer, care, counsel, encouragement, and accountable relationship.

- Solid biblical and Kingdom-centered teaching that strengthens leaders and congregations.
- Opportunities for leadership development, ministry collaboration, and regional fellowship.
- Supportive peer relationships that reduce isolation without erasing local identity.
- Pathways to participate in Kingdom Reign Church expansion, Kingdom of God College learning, and community transformation initiatives when appropriate.

Relationship pathways

Pathway	Primary need	Typical first conversation
Fellowship relationship	Peer connection, prayer, shared learning	Values, doctrine, participation, communication
Spiritual covering	Counsel, accountability, pastoral relationship	Authority, boundaries, care, conflict, review
Identity-preserving partnership	Deeper alignment while retaining local name	Governance, branding, commitments, autonomy
Joint ministry collaboration	A defined outreach or training project	Outcome, roles, resources, safeguarding
KRC exploration	Launching or becoming a KRC expression	Readiness, authorization, formation, launch support

These pathways are not automatic stages, ranks, or interchangeable labels. The right path depends on the church's calling, current relationships, governing documents, doctrinal alignment, and the consent of authorized leaders.

A healthy exploratory process

1. Listen: clarify why the church is seeking relationship and what outcomes it hopes to pursue.
2. Learn: exchange vision, doctrine, history, governance, and current ministry information.
3. Discern: identify alignment, questions, boundaries, and matters requiring prayer or counsel.
4. Define: document the proposed relationship, mutual commitments, decision authority, and review process.
5. Decide: obtain the approvals required by each organization before any public announcement or operational change.

Institutional story and ministry family

Churches In One Accord was established in 1999 by Drs. B. Theron and Grace M. Williams. Its history reflects a continuing movement from local congregational ministry toward a relational fellowship that equips churches and leaders to demonstrate the government, culture, and values of the Kingdom of

God. Kingdom Reign Church, Kingdom of God College, and the Center for Diplomacy represent distinct but related expressions of that mission: congregational formation, education and leadership development, and community or diplomatic engagement.

KINGDOM CENTER The fellowship is organized around a shared message and way of life: perceiving the Father, receiving adoption through the Son, living by the Spirit, and manifesting the Kingdom.
